




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When We Become Our Childhood Sports Heroes

This is something many of today's adults would say if they saw a football player do a bicycle kick — an acrobatic backflip type of kick — attributing it to a character that has inspired many children in the Arab world to play football— the animated Captain Majid.


A Gift of Art to Our Readers:

Enjoy meeting an artistic version of another legendary football player named Majid: Captain Majid Abdullah.

Nicknamed 'The Arabian Pelé,' and 'Al Sahm Al Multaheb' (The Flaming Arrow), Majid Abdullah was born in Jeddah in 1959, and graced the football fields of the world for more than 40 years with his club Al-Nassr and the Saudi national team as a striker.

Recognized for his iconic number '9' sports t-shirt, and best known for being the all-time leading goal scorer for his country, Majid still has many other milestones under his belt, including: being the first captain of the Saudi national team in the World Cup, winning the AFC Asian Cup more than once with the national team, and reaching the World Cup finals and advancing to round 16 for the first time in 1994.

Ben Mosley is a renowned expressionist artist best known for being one of Britain's leading live painters, as well as the official artist for the British Olympic team (Team GB).

Influenced by legendary artists such as Picasso, Matisse, Van Gogh, and Lowry, Ben's work is characterized by vibrant storytelling and dynamic live painting performances, which he's taken up a notch by incorporating 24-karat gold and precious metals as hallmarks of his own unique style.

"Sport is a powerful force that unites people from all walks of life in celebration," he told Ithraeyat in an interview.

"It is a compelling subject for my art because of its tribal nature—the sense of belonging and community it fosters."



From the dust of ancient arenas to the pages of epic myths, sports have been part of the human story since the dawn of time. A testament to the human drive to explore and push their abilities, sports has been invented and reinvented throughout different civilizations and cultures, and continues to do so today.

Here, we honor one of the oldest and most revered gatherings of the fastest and the strongest - The **Ancient Olympics** (776 BCE-393 CE).

They were far more than athletic contests they were a philosophical celebration of human excellence. Founded in Olympia, Greece, these games were held every four years in honor of the ancient God Zeus.

There are different mythical origins related to the games - some related to Hercules, and others drawing from a more treacherous and accursed origin known as 'Pelop's Chariot Race.'









Year of: **Handcrafts**The Art of Falcon Hoods

Every part of Falconry is an art. Their hoods are as distinctive as their feathers and style.

But these intricate hoods are more than a stylish accessory representing tradition and cultural pride. They help calm the bird and control its focus during training sessions, whereby removing the hood signals it's time for some falconry. It also prevents the bird of prey from getting frightened during travel or when in crowded areas.

They are often handmade from fine leather and decorated with embroidery or tassels, especially in Middle Eastern falconry. Traditional Arab falcon hoods are known as "al-burqa" or "al-qaffaz" in Arabic, and are always works of art, reflecting heritage, creativity, status, and craftsmanship.



Where The World's First Football Game Began

So who kicked the first ball? There are many stories about the origin of the beloved football, some even crediting the simple act of kicking a round pebble out of the way as the inspiration behind it.

And indeed, there have been ball games across many cultures throughout history, but the earliest known game resembling football is the ancient Chinese game Cuju, literally meaning 'kick the ball', and dating back to 200 BCE.

Ball games kept evolving across various cultures — including various types of rubber ball games played across ancient Mesoamerica that the Spanish encountered when they landed in the New World — until the 1800s when it became the current one beloved by people the world over.




or Saeed Al-Owairan electrifying a nation on the world stage, these visuals transcend borders and eras, etching themselves deeply into our collective memory.






In 1990, in the heart of Milan, a twelveyear-old Italian boy watched with his friends a football miracle: Cameroon defeats Maradona. However, the boy did not pay attention to who scored the goal, but to the one who kept his team steady with only nine players, against the legends from the Tango nation.

That goalkeeper, who appeared to him like the heroes of epics, standing tall between the posts, was Thomas N'Kono. And from that moment, Gianluigi Buffon changed his favored position from midfielder to goalkeeper, to later become a legend himself, as if carrying that moment forward.

It is a story that echoes the tale of Theseus when he saw Heracles in his grandfather's palace and chose to follow in his path of danger and glory. Both the Italian boy and the Greek boy saw in those men not just a person, but a road worth following.

Origins on the Pitch: Al-Qadsiah, Al-Nassr, and a Nation's Game Begins

Football was never just a game for us, it had always been woven into the social and cultural fabric of Saudi Arabia, a way to express identity, community, and belonging. Since the sport's local emergence in the early 20th century, young enthusiasts took to narrow streets and open lots, forming informal teams named after their neighborhoods.

These humble spaces were their first pitches.

Over time, the game grew: clubs were founded, regional tournaments emerged, and in 1977, the Kingdom launched its first professional league, the Saudi Premier League, with eight clubs from across the country.



Ambassadors for sports: A collection of stamps from Finland, 1989, showcasing popular sports in the country. Source **Wikimedia Commons**.









From the **Shelves:**Our Oldest Human Arts



Sports and storytelling are two of the oldest human arts. Both flourished in different styles around the world: from stickball among the Algonquin people, and falconry in ancient Mesopotamia, to "mob football" in medieval England and the martial arts in China. These sports also influenced local literary forms, as storytellers vied to tell tales of winners and losers.

Nowadays, to read a good sports story is to be transported to the scene: muscles tense as you cheer or flinch or shout advice at your favorite player. But in a great sports story, we find much more: explorations of the limits of the human body, thoughts about the nature of hierarchy, and diatribes on the essence of competition.





From the Vault: The Art of Movement



Capturing movement in art is a challenging art form in itself.

Very few artists can create dynamic celebrations of the senses, but the crown would have to go to the legendary Leonardo da Vinci. His 1510 anatomical **Vitruvian**Man dissected movement with scientific precision. The sketch echoes a gymnast's pose in a timeless freeze of athletic grace.

In the area of sports, it is wonderful to discover artists that challenge the elements of movement and the dynamic essence of sports and explore a new way to express art. A good example is Futurist artist Umberto Boccioni who intentionally rejected traditional imagery and created works that were modern and radical, such as his 1913 **Dynamism of a Soccer Player** that shattered form to show speed's essence.





An empty dusty street, a grassy lot, or even just an alleyway between two buildings; any spot can easily be turned into a playing field. After all, where there's a will and passion, there's a way... and there's a sport.

As these beautiful photos from Aramco Archives capture, there was no need for fancy stadiums or even golf links; people came with their balls, their clubs, their excitement, and played their hearts out.

What these images capture is the ultimate team spirit, that invisible force that turns individual talent into collective triumph.



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
